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BUREAU OF MEDICAL CANNABIS REGULATION TO HOLD PUBLIC REGULATION HEARING IN SAN JOSE

The Bureau of Medical Cannabis Regulation (Bureau) will hold its fourth public regulation hearing in San Jose to receive comments regarding the recent release of the bureau's proposed medical cannabis regulations. The regulations include general provisions applicable to all bureau licenses, distributors, transporters, dispensaries and testing laboratories. All members of the public are invited and encouraged to participate.

WHERE: King Library, 2nd floor, 150 East San Fernando Street, San Jose, CA 95112

WHEN: Tuesday, June 13, 2017 from 1 to 6 p.m.

The schedule for the day will be as follows:

1:00 – 4:00 p.m. Public comment on the medical cannabis regulations for general provisions applicable to all bureau licenses, distributors, transporters and dispensaries.

4:00 – 6:00 p.m. Public comment on the medical cannabis regulations for testing laboratories.

“The proposed regulations for medical cannabis are the result of countless hours of research, stakeholder outreach, informational sessions and pre-regulatory meetings all across the state,” Bureau Chief Lori Ajax said. “And while we have done quite a bit of work and heard from thousands of people, there is still so much more to do. In order to make our program successful we still need your feedback.”

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In 2015, the Legislature passed and the Governor signed into law three bills (Assembly Bills 243 and 266, and Senate Bill 643) that create a licensing and regulatory framework for medical cannabis through the Medical Cannabis Regulation and Safety Act. It is anticipated that the regulations will be developed by January 1, 2018. On November 8, 2016, the Control, Regulate, and Tax Adult Use of Marijuana Act (AUMA) was passed by voters as Proposition 64. AUMA legalizes the adult use of cannabis by persons 21 years of age and older.
